

# Students with Disabilities and Section 504

## WHAT IS SECTION 504?

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 covers qualified students with disabilities who attend schools, programs, or activities that receive federal funds. It applies to all public schools and to private schools if they receive federal funding. Section 504 requires that school districts provide a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to qualified students who have a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities.
